BUILDING BRIDGES TO BOOROWA

Andrew Scott (North Sydney Bushcare) described the 'Building Bridges to Boorowa' program, a remarkable 25-year partnership between North Sydney Bushcare and Boorowa Community Landcare Group. The key drivers for the program were, and still are, the shrinking habitat of the Superb Parrot and other endangered birds, as well as environmental challenges of soil salinity. Since it began in 2000 volunteers from North Sydney have been working alongside Boorowa Landcare volunteers to plant over 73,000 native trees and shrubs across the region. These efforts have created wildlife corridors, combated soil degradation, and enhanced natural habitats. The program's success lies in collaboration, with each partner playing a crucial role: volunteers contribute time, farmers prepare sites and purchase trees, and councils provide support.

It is a brilliant model on which to build more city-country partnerships resulting in wonderful ecological transformations and stronger community spirit. Talk is on the OFF YouTube channel (with some cuts due to tech issues).

RED HANDS CAVE, GLENBROOK

The walk to Red Hands Cave at Glenbrook, scheduled for Sunday 30th June, was postponed as the track was closed and there was a high chance of dubious weather. It may be run at a later date, after the track is re-opened.

GLENLEE UPDATE

Friends of Glenlee (FoG) has issued an update on actions being taken:

- Meeting with Minister for Environment and Heritage, Penny Sharpe FoG executives met with the Minister on 12 June. The focus was the need for a comprehensive conservation management plan for the site and assessment for Aboriginal and natural heritage. Unfortunately the Minister was not willing to consider what she might be able to do, being advised that she did not have the powers to authorise such inspections.
- Continued protection of Glenlee and its historical artefacts

The focus for FoG had shifted slightly and is now on protection of the site and artefacts on the site. Representations have been made to Council, when locals were concerned at the works taking place on the property. Council stated that "the owner was advised to cease all works immediately and not conduct further works until written approval has been provided by Council".

Meeting with the new owners

FoG executives met the new owner on site on 18 June, noting work had taken place to address issues with the house. There is a caretaker on the site apparently undertaking gardening. The owner indicated his intention to build 3-4 houses for his extended family on the site. Most historical artefacts have been removed, but he said that the local museums had been down to consider preserving some of the settler tools and other items.

2024 PLANTING EVENTS

The next planting in our area is a National Tree Day event led by Georges River Council on 28th June at Pearce Avenue Reserve, Peakhurst. This is Bushcare's biggest event of the year and will help enhance native plant corridors within our Local Government Area (LGA). Bring your own gloves, hat and water bottle and wear appropriate clothing, long sleeves, long pants and enclosed footwear. All tools will be provided. Entrance to the reserve is from Pearce Avenue. Remember Sunday, 28 July 2024, 10.00am - 1.00pm.

NSW COAL WATCH (www.lockthegate.org.au)

Coal mine expansions threaten our land, water and future.

If NSW citizens are to avoid worsening extreme weather events, like floods, droughts and fires, then there can be no new coal mine expansions. But coal companies want to pour fuel on the climate fire. They have plans for up to 19 new coal mine expansions in NSW. If approved, the lifecycle greenhouse gas emissions from these coal expansions would be equivalent to 17 years of NSW annual emissions. NSW can't meet climate goals, and neither can Australia or the globe, if these mines go ahead.

The NSW Premier and his Ministers can take action to ensure these projects do not go ahead.

KOALA FILM

On the evening of Thursday, June 20, 12 OFF members attended a screening of the newly released documentary film *The Koalas*, at the Dendy Newtown. This film was produced by Georgia Wallace-Crabbe and Greg Miller. It highlighted the plight of Koalas in many areas, eg, Victorian native plantations, the area south-west of Sydney at Mount Gilead, where housing development is causing extreme loss of habitat, including tree corridors. It also showed a small victory where traditional owners have halted logging of large sections of native plantations. The dedicated work of volunteers who care for injured and sick koalas in the Port Macquarie region was also shown. It is hoped a screening will be arranged somewhere in the Sutherland Shire. The screening was followed by in-person discussion with Georgina and Greg and speakers from WIRES and Save Sydney Koalas.

GANNONS PARK PLANTING EVENT

OFF members participated, along with many other enthusiastic people, in a hugely successful planting day at Gannons Park south on Saturday, 29th June. It was organised by Greater Sydney Landcare, Georges River Council Bushcare, and Oatley Flora and Fauna. A record number of volunteers -

about 150 - made fast work of planting 3,000 plants on an area formerly a tip. It was wonderful to see groups come from all over Sydney and as far away as India lt is fabulous to see so many like- minded people of all ages, caring for the environment and wanting to make the world a better greener and healthier place.



One of the groups was Shah Satnam Ji Green S Welfare Force Wing -Australia. More than 50 volunteers came from this group which was originally founded in India and is based on the teachings of Saint Dr Ram Rahim Singh Ji Insan. They work for the community and the environment and have planted more than 40 million trees worldwide. They are also regular participants in blood and plasma donations, helping the less fortunate in India as well as environmental work such as clean ups and plantings. SOLAR COULD LEAVE NUCLEAR & ALL ELSE IN THE SHADE

As reported by the ABC, the Economist magazine has recently produced a special issue: The Dawn of the Solar Age. The Economist is a British weekly news magazine that has reported on economic thinking and served as a place for economists to exchange views since 1843. The Economist reported solar power was growing so quickly it was set to become the biggest source of electricity on the planet by the mid-2030s. By the 2040s - within this next generation - it could be the world's largest source of energy of any kind, overtaking fossil fuels like coal and oil. Installed solar capacity is doubling every three years, meaning it has grown tenfold in the past 10 years. Moreover every forecast by the International Energy Agency (IEA) for growth of solar since 2009 has been wrong, being much lower than reality. Even the most optimistic forecast, by Greenpeace, has been way short of reality. Batteries are more difficult, but even there, the Economist reports that the

efficiency of batteries is soaring and the price is plummeting.

Oxford University energy specialist Rupert Way finds that a "fast transition" scenario based on the actual installations of solar means that by 2060, solar will be by far the world's biggest source of energy, exceeding wind and green hydrogen and leaving nuclear with an infinitesimally tiny role.


